

Originally from Queensland, Australia, MICHAEL S. MURRAY is renowned as a leader in church music in America today. For two decades he directed and built the music program at the Church of the Redeemer in Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts, to become one of the most respected in New England, the pinnacle of which was overseeing the installation of the \$1.7 million Schoenstein pipe organ in 2018.

Throughout his career, Michael has appeared on numerous recordings. Most recently, he was honored to be considered for four Grammy nominations for "Love so amazing", a recording of the hymn arrangements of Stuart Forster, with the combined choirs of the Church of the Redeemer and Christ Church, Cambridge. "Vivat Regina! The Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II", a commemorative recording of organ, choral, and instrumental music, from the Church of the Redeemer, launched to critical acclaim. Correspondence once this recording was released included complimentary notes of appreciation from both Buckingham Palace and Balmoral Castle at the behest of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

As soloist and accompanist, Michael is noted for his versatile range and colorful interpretation, appearing at venerated cathedrals, churches, and concert halls across the United States, Europe, and Australasia, as well as in lighter capacities, such as Sydney's Cabaret Convention. He has performed as part of the conventions and conclaves of the American Institute of Organbuilders, the International Society of Organbuilders, the American Guild of Organists, and the Association of Anglican Musicians. As an author, his writings have been published in both hemispheres. In 1999, he was awarded first place in the Herbert Davis Organ Competition, the most prestigious organ competition in the southern hemisphere.

After nearly thirty years of regular church work, he now enjoys a vocational occupation within the cathedral of hospitality in Palm Beach — The Breakers. In his role as "Personal Concierge", he handles the detailed arrangements for The Breakers' most distinguished of guests, whilst still still being in high demand as a professional organist & choir trainer. He now resides in West Palm Beach, where he lives with his husband Stuart and foodmotivated fur babies Wills and Bentley.

A Word of Welcome


Welcome to the Episcopal Church of Bethesda-by-the-Sea for this special evening of prayer, contemplation, and song. If you are visiting with us this evening, we are especially delighted you have joined us and bid you a warm welcome.

The service of Evensong, or sung Evening Prayer, is sometimes called "the crown jewel of Anglican liturgy" as it is based almost entirely on Scripture and generously bequeathed with the rich legacy of the choral tradition. Some of the language will take us away from the mundane, offering a moment to reflect on our part among the countless generations who pray before and after us. Some responses will be sung between the Officiant and the Choir; the Congregation joins in singing the hymns and the Apostles' Creed. Your active participation in the italicized portions of the prayers is a blessing to all of us.

The Lessons read at Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer are part of a two-year cycle containing all of Holy Scripture. Likewise, prayer at Bethesda continues daily, and you are warmly invited to join us for Morning Prayer at 8:30 a.m. on Tuesdays through Fridays, for Holy Eucharist at 12:05 p.m. on Wednesdays, on Sunday mornings at 8:00 & 10:00 a.m., and, resuming in October, for 4:00 p.m. Evensong on the first Sunday of the month. Please know that there is always a place for you at Bethesda-by-the-Sea.



THE FIRST LESSON

Leviticus 25:1–17

The Lord spoke to Moses on Mount Sinai, saying: Speak to the people of Israel and say to them: When you enter the land that I am giving you, the land shall observe a sabbath for the Lord. For six years you shall sow your field, and for six years you shall prune your vineyard, and gather in their yield; but in the seventh year there shall be a sabbath of complete rest for the land, a sabbath for the Lord: you shall not sow your field or prune your vineyard. You shall not reap the aftergrowth of your harvest or gather the grapes of your unpruned vine: it shall be a year of complete rest for the land. You may eat what the land yields during its sabbath—you, your male and female slaves, your hired and your bound labourers who live with you; for your livestock also, and for the wild animals in your land all its yield shall be for food. You shall count off seven weeks of years, seven times seven years, so that the period of seven weeks of years gives fortynine years. Then you shall have the trumpet sounded loud; on the tenth day of the seventh month—on the day of atonement—you shall have the trumpet sounded throughout all your land. And you shall hallow the fiftieth year and you shall proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants. It shall be a jubilee for you: you shall return, every one of you, to your property and every one of you to your family. That fiftieth year shall be a jubilee for you: you shall not sow, or reap the aftergrowth, or harvest the unpruned vines. For it is a jubilee; it shall be holy to you: you shall eat only what the field itself produces. In this year of jubilee you shall return, every one of you, to your property. When you make a sale to your neighbour or buy from your neighbour, you shall not cheat one another. When you buy from your neighbour, you shall pay only for the number of years since the jubilee; the seller shall charge you only for the remaining crop-years. If the years are more, you shall increase the price, and if the years are fewer, you shall diminish the price; for it is a certain number of harvests that are being sold to you. You shall not cheat one another, but you shall fear your God; for I am the Lord your God.

THE SECOND LESSON James 1:2–8, 16–18

My brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of any kind, consider it nothing but joy, because you know that the testing of your faith produces endurance; and let endurance have its full effect, so that you may be mature and complete, lacking in nothing. If any of you is lacking in wisdom, ask God, who gives to all generously and ungrudgingly, and it will be given you. But ask in faith, never doubting, for the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, driven and tossed by the wind; for the doubter, being double-minded and unstable in every way, must not expect to receive anything from the Lord. Do not be deceived, my beloved. Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. In fulfilment of his own purpose he gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures.


